Recycle Bins Delay

Solid Waste department of the City of Albuquerque has informed the HEAR board that there will be a delay in the time table for getting our recycle bins. The reason: an independent company is building a processing facility now and it will be completed by March 2013. Solid Waste said their current facility couldn't handle the volume if they put them out in 2012 (as previously planned). Shortly after March is when they will start disbursing the bins. All Albuquerque neighborhoods will have those bins by the end of 2013. They will do a special mailing to us to let us know when we will be getting ours. Starting in March, however, cabq.gov web site will have more information. Enter your zip code and the site should let you know when to be expecting your new bin.

Neighborhood Security Update

Dear Friends and neighbors,

I'd like to take this time to give you a brief update on the recent security activities of U.S. Security Associates.

As some of you may have observed, during the month of November and running until Christmas, U. S. Security switched from nighttime patrols to daytime patrols, during weekdays. They maintained nighttime patrols on the weekends. Some may have wondered why this was so.

The reason the HEAR board of directors decided to do this, is because we felt that, the period prior to the Christmas holiday is time when, unfortunately, nefarious characters most like to perform home break-ins and steal those presents you purchased for family and loved ones. So, we felt as this usually happens during working hours, it would be wise to patrol during the day as a possible preventative.

During these daytime patrols, many of you may have been approached by a patrol officer about your open garage doors. I know this because I receive all of the written reports of these episodes from U. S. Security. In most, but not all cases, there was a resident present that the patrol officer would engage. If no one was visible to the officer, he would do a 'walk-up' and inform the homeowner.

This is the perfect segue to discuss open garage doors and the board's changed policy regarding them. At our October general membership meeting the subject of open garage doors, and how U. S. Security would respond to them, was discussed at great length. It was this discussion that led to the following policy change:

The original policy, as stated in the prior HEAR newsletter, was that, on weekdays and Sundays, if the U. S. Security patrol officer observed an open garage door at 10 p.m. or earlier, they would do a walk-up to notify the resident. On Friday and Saturday nights they would do a walk-up until midnight.

During the general membership meeting the majority of residents felt strongly that there should be NO time limit for the patrol to do a walk-up when they encountered an open garage door! In the ensuing discussion, by the HEAR board members, it was unanimously decided that we would implement this change to eliminate the time restrictions and inform U. S. Security of this new policy. Which the board did.

In conclusion: Currently and ongoing, regardless of the hour, if a security officer encounters a open garage door, they WILL do a walk-up and attempt to inform the resident that their garage door is opened!

As this doorbell-ring may come at any time during the night, I implore you; please, prior to retiring for the evening, check your garage door to ensure it is closed. It will surely save you from potential theft, and that jarring doorbell-ring!

And, if you observe a neighbor's garage door is open, please be your neighbor's keeper and inform them. It's the neighborly thing to do. And, they'll appreciate your concern.

Mediation services are available for the following types of situations: noise, nuisance, property maintenance, pets, harassment, landlord-tenant


Mediation is a voluntary, private dispute resolution process in which a trained Mediator assists the parties in reaching an outcome that is mutually agreeable.

For The Birds

Do you ever wish you had more birds in your backyard to enjoy on cold winter days such as we had in January? With very little effort you can attract them by providing what they need, food, water, and shelter. Most of the birds which frequent our neighborhood are ground feeders such as House Finches, House Sparrows, Juncos, White-winged, Mourning, and Eurasian Collared Doves which can be attracted by simply scattering mixed grain on the ground in an area near escape cover and which can be seen from the house. Tiny Pine Siskins and colorful Lesser Goldfinches can be easily attracted by providing niger (sometimes called thistle) in a mesh bag or thistle feeder. Also popular with most of the birds are suet cakes in a plasticized wire feeder, and peanut butter pressed into the bark of trees, or in holes drilled in small pieces of firewood. Downy and Ladder-backed Woodpeckers, and Red-shafted Flickers will use nearly any kind of feeder, and Western Scrub Jays will eat nearly anything, no matter how it is offered.

Then there are Rock Pigeons, present in great numbers, here as in any large city! They can be discouraged by feeding the other ground-feeding birds under shrubs along a wall. They are reluctant to enter such as area which lacks an easy escape route. Cooper's Hawks, which feed on birds, mostly doves, can be a problem, but should be recognized as a natural part of the food chain.

In Winter, birds have a hard time finding water which is just as important as food. On mornings when the temperature is below freezing, I pour boiling water into the bird waterer, and it is immediately surrounded by thirsty birds.

Fire Safety for the Elderly


It is that time of the year that people fire up their home appliances to keep warm but they must ensure safety measures have been implemented and they know important fire safety tips to prevent fire. Since the beginning of Fall, the Albuquerque Fire Department has responded to six fires in which half were caused by home heating appliances.

People 65 years and older are at a significantly higher risk of dying in home fires than the rest of the general population. The risk of fire death increases exponentially with every new decade of age after a person reaches 65. An elderly woman had to be rescued by firefighters because she was trapped behind a double bolted door. Please read over the following safety tips to protect yourself, and your family and home from fire.

- 1. Install smoke alarms in every home, on every level, outside each sleeping area and in each bedroom.
- 2. Know two ways out of every room and practice a home escape plan once a month.
- 3. Heating:
 - a. Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
 - b. Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable heater.
 - c. Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container outside away from anything that can burn.

Some Helpful Hints about Yard/Garage Sales

City Rules (for residences):

- One garage/yard sale allowed every twelve months
- A sale may not exceed three days in length
- Only normally accumulated household goods can be sold
- Only one non-illuminated sign, no more than six sq. feet area.
- No signs in medians or on utility poles
- Call the City's Zoning and Residential Code Office at (505) 924-3850 for questions

Recommendations:

- Safety in Numbers: If possible, have an assistant to help you.
 Have a designated cashier/bagger. Consider having a "greeter".
- Visibility: Be out in the open, not hidden away out of sight.
 Good sight lines are safer. Avoid having a garage sale IN the garage; use the driveway and front yard.
- Pricing: Make sure customers know ALL SALES FINAL. You want to avoid someone coming back to your home the next day to try to return something for a refund.
- Cash handling: Have lots of change (singles, quarters)
- Mid-way through sale: Stop a moment and assess; consolidate unsold items.

- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- 4. Install battery operated CO detector in your home and check or replace the battery when you change the time on your clocks.
- If you have elderly family members or neighbors, please check on them regularly to ensure their homes are fire safe.
