President's Message - HEAR Working for You!

You may notice a theme in this edition of the Heritage East Herald. The theme is this: What has HEAR done for you and what can you do to help.

There are 1240 homes in Heritage East, making it one of the largest and most successful neighborhood associations in Albuquerque. Last year, approximately 47% of you paid your HEAR dues. Although this is a large percentage of members for any volunteer neighborhood association, it is still not enough.

What does HEAR do for you for \$25 per year? For starters, we are one of the very few voluntary neighborhood associations to provide a security service. That service costs about \$12,000 per year for three, 30 minute, daily patrols. We also hire local teens to pick up trash, twice a month in the spring, summer and fall, and once a month in the winter. The cost - about \$2,000 a year. We publish three newsletters at a cost of over \$3,000 per year, and we do beautification projects such as painting the walls at Ridgefield and Redmont, costing several hundred dollars for each wall and upgrade signs to neighborhood entrances. Not to mention our two annual meetings at a total cost of around \$500.

How does that add up? 580 members x \$25 annual dues = 14,500 income. Expenses, however, are over \$18,000 a year. We are fortunate in that HEAR still has almost \$20,508 in assets, but that figure will fall dramatically if we don't increase

our membership.

Not everything HEAR does costs money. We have no paid staff, but we have a great team of board members and volunteers that work hard for HEAR. The Beautification & Zoning Committee has sent out over 150 violation notices over the past few years, and HEAR worked with the Rotary Club and the City of Albuquerque to upgrade Rotary Park at no cost to us.

We also worked with Councilor Brad Winter to upgrade the Ventura Boulevard Parkway, and to provide us with the Heritage East sign on San Francisco, again at no cost to HEAR. We also send regular neighborhood updates by e-mail to keep our members informed of the happenings in Heritage East. *continued on pg. 4*

Neighborhood Security Update

You may or may not know that, as of March, this year, HEAR has hired a new security company to patrol our neighborhood. They are "TRU Security". As with our prior security company, TRU Security is patrolling seven nights a week between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. They will be patrolling three times per night. Also, as before, during certain times of the year we will switch to daytime patrols.

TRU Security patrols using white, unmarked, Ford Crown Victoria police style cars, with black push-bars on the front of the vehicle. The cars do not have a rotating amber light on top, but do have standard police style internal multicolor flashing lights in front and back. They will only turn on the flashing lights when they stop to investigate an incident, or when they stop to do a "walk-up" to a home to report an open garage door.

HEAR Annual Spring Meeting a Success!

Many HEAR residents joined the HEAR Board of Directors for our Annual Spring Meeting held on April 17th at the Domingo Baca Multigenerational Center. The meeting was hosted by City Councilor Brad Winter, who provided snacks and beverages to those in attendance. Councilor Winter gave an informative presentation regarding our neighborhood and the City, as well as updating us on the Paseo del Norte and I-25 upgrade and the plans for expanding the multigenerational center. The Board thanked Councilor Winter for his help in providing funds to upgrade the parkway along Ventura. Councilor Winter addressed questions from our residents, and will be reviewing the City response time to 311 calls - several residents had concerns as to why it takes up to six weeks for the City to respond. He is also working diligently with the City Council and the Mayor to address the issues at APD.

Captain Joey Rodriguez, TRU SECURITY, gave a short presentation regarding their nightly security patrols for Heritage East Residents. Captain Rodriguez responded to questions, and provided a contact number for TRU SECURITY (505-515-0067) for non emergency issues. His company has also posted TRU SECURITY signs throughout the neighborhood.

Thanks to all of our HEAR residents that took the time to support our neighborhood and attend this meeting!

There are several noteworthy difference between TRU Security and our prior security company:

- 1. TRU hires officers who are former and retired police and military personnel.
- 2. TRU patrol officers are armed with guns, tasers and pepper spray. Also, they have have lapel video cameras which they use to record any incident they encounter. The security company's first line of defense is to call the police! They will only draw/use a weapon as a last resort if they are severely threatened and in immediate personal danger.

Note: For emergencies call 911. For non-emergency incidents TRU Security can be contacted, day or night, at 505-515-0067.

TRU Security is providing HEAR with weekly incident reports. Aside from two incidents involving teens smoking pot in their cars near Rotary Park (police and parents were called), the majority of incident reports are of open garage doors. Thankfully, there seem to be fewer garage door reports then in the past.

As TRU Security is still quite new to HEAR, we have been evaluating their service, and, thus far, The Board of Directors is very happy with their performance!

HEAR is currently the only neighborhood association that offers this invaluable security service! And, as TRU Security hires only experienced law enforcement professionals, their service comes at a higher monthly cost, which the Board believes is more than worth it! Please talk to your neighbors and let them know of this service the association provides on their behalf. And, if they are NOT yet members of HEAR, please encourage them to join and help fund this valuable service.

Our funds go directly to support our neighborhood, and are administered by an unpaid and voluntary board of directors that work with dedicated committee members. We have committed Heritage East residents that spend many hours of their time attending meetings and making decisions to ensure that we have a beautiful and safe place to live. Our neighborhood projects are proposed by our residents at our board and general membership meetings and voted on by the entire board. We encourage all residents to provide input regarding our projects.

Your HEAR Neighborhood Association makes a difference in your quality of life, property values, and safety for you and your family.

Your participation in HEAR is critical. Please help us support our neighborhood by becoming an active and participating member of HEAR!

HEAR Accomplishments

•Since 2009, HEAR has contracted with a security company that patrols the entire neighborhood several times per night, 7 days per week. This greatly assists in keeping our homes, neighborhood, and Rotary Park safe.

•HEAR has issued over 150 letters/personal contacts to residents to enforce neighborhood covenants and zoning laws, to keep our neighborhood free of junk cars, weeds, illegally parked trailers, and ensure that home business occupations are in accordance with City regulations. We have an excellent response to our contacts (85% compliance). Those residents that do not comply are reported to the City of Albuquerque or Bernalillo County for enforcement.

•HEAR keeps our residents informed through newsletters, regular email updates, a web site, and two general membership meetings per year.

•HEAR worked closely with the City to upgrade Rotary Park. Over \$500K of City funds were spent to install new equipment and landscaping at the park.

•HEAR requested and received City funds to upgrade Ventura from Palomas to Harper with rock landscaping and an installation of weed barrier. This project is still in progress.

•HEAR worked with affected residents and the City to stop the building of town homes on De Vargas Loop - we were successful.

•HEAR volunteers open and close Rotary Park gates daily.

•HEAR painted entrance walls at Ventura Estates and Ridgefield and installed a new entrance sign on San Francisco. Upgrade of entrance signs at Yorktown and Freedom Way is underway.

•HEAR actively represents our residents in the District 4 Coalition of Neighborhood Associations.

•HEAR installed plastic bag dispenser boxes for dog waste at Rotary Park and on our walking trails. Boxes are filled with reusable plastic bags by residents and HEAR volunteers. HEAR volunteers pick up dog waste and trash at Rotary Park and on walking trails on a daily basis.

•HEAR works with APD and Criminal Nuisance Abatement at the City to resolve vacant housing and criminal abatement issues.

•In 2010, HEAR contracted with a local landscaping company to clean and remove weeds backing San Francisco, Jacabo, Giddings, Ventura, etc.

•HEAR contracts with neighborhood students to clean up trash and

debris on local arterial streets and Domingo Baca Arroyo on a regular basis.

•HEAR provides a VOICE for YOU at our General Membership meetings! Our speakers for 2013-2014 have included Mayor RJ Berry and City Councilor Brad Winter.

•HEAR volunteers provide a monthly recycling effort for collecting recyclable aluminum.

•HEAR board members have a "meet and confer" status with Councilor Brad Winter for new neighborhood projects as well as requesting assistance to resolve neighborhood issues.



ZONING AND BEAUTIFICATION

Your Zoning and Beautification Committee has been working hard to keep your neighborhood beautiful and our residents in compliance with our covenants. This requires diligent efforts by members of the Committee to respond to the concerns of our residents. Committee members must review and research each complaint, and when applicable, contact property owners by letter or phone for request for compliance. In some cases, issues are forwarded to the City. Some recent resolutions are highlighted below:

- · Jacobo, NE Bad weeds, unkempt yard, contacted owner, resolved, October 2013
- Lew Wallace NE Debris in Curb and Gutter Owner contacted and issue resolved November 2013
- Don Thomas, NE Fifth Wheel Parked in Driveway non-compliance with Zoning Code regulations -Resolved October 2013
- Freedom Court, NE vacant property issues, weeds in yard, etc. Turned over to City December 12, 2013, resolved January 2014
- · Calhoun, NE Weeds, poor landscaping Sent to City for enforcement, resolved April 2014
- · General Kerney NE illegal utility trailer, unkempt yard resolved April 2014
- Meriwether, NE trailer parked on street for long period of time resolved May 2014
- * Macallan/Palomas vacant house, weeds. On-going problem after numerous attempts by HEAR and the City to resolve a permanent weed problem with the property owner. Currently working with City officials for resolution to this issue. May require meeting with Mayor Berry and/or City Council staff.
- Palomas, NE Block wall in bad condition. Resolved in April 2014

With Spring here, please do your part by keeping your shrubs, trees and lawns trimmed, and your rock landscaping weed free! The area between the curb and sidewalk is the responsibility of the property owner to maintain, NOT the City!
