Are we Neighborly or Merely Neighbors?

According to the 2010 census, in the square mile of Albuquerque in which our neighborhood is located we have 4,903 neighbors in 1734 homes. While Heritage East is only half of that square mile, we have bulk of the homes (1,249) and neighbors in our neighborhood. That is a lot of people in a relatively small area - meaning we have a lot of neighbors.

You will notice that there is no mention of our relationships with our neighbors in this definition - only a reference to being near to each other. I don't know about you, but I like to think of my neighbors as more than the people that I live near. I prefer to think about my neighbors in terms of the relationships that I have with them, what I know about their lives, what they know about mine, and the mutual efforts we make to make each other's lives better. When we live close to each other we can't help but get to know each other in some way, but how is that knowledge shaped? By our interactions and actions. This is where the concept of being neighborly comes in:



For The Birds

Another Summer is gone, and some birds have started South for the Winter. Many shore birds, which you are not likely to see in Heritage East, started moving South as early as July. Soon after the middle of August, Rufous Hummingbirds were plentiful at my feeder and driving away the Black chins and Broadtails. Things are a little quieter now. In late August I saw a female Ladder-backed Woodpecker drinking sugar water at the Hummingbird feeder, and surprisingly, eating, or trying to eat, thistle from the niger feeder. A small flock of Bushtits born just this summer are so tame that they feed in the Bird-of-Paradise shrubs within four or five feet of me, showing absolutely no fear.

I am still putting out a small amount of mixed grains, black oil sunflower seed, and niger even now when the living is easy, but in a couple of months I will increase them to the Winter amounts.

This article is a little different from my others in that it includes a bit of information on pollinators, particularly butterflies. Although largely overlooked by the average person, pollinators are very important, in fact, without them, most forms of life on Earth would be impossible. Some plants are pollinated by wind and some are self-pollinated, but most are pollinated by insects such as bees, butterflies, wasps, and in the New World, hummingbirds. Probably the biggest problems pollinators face today is habitat loss to urban sprawl and the continuing use of herbicides and insecticides. As the world population continues to grow, there seems to be little we can do to stop urban sprawl, but there are things that we as suburban home owners can do about the use of herbicides and insecticides give only temporary relief from plants and insects which we don't like, but their effects are not specific to their target species, so they kill many other plant species and inspect species which are important pollinators.

Two of the things we can do to help pollinators are 1) Severely restrict or discontinue the use of herbicides and insecticides., 2) Plant mostly native plant species which pollinators favor and to which they are adapted.

Some of these plants are: Acacia (Acacia sp.), Yarrow (Achillea sp.), Milkweed (Asclepias sp.), Aster (Aster sp.), Butterfly Bush (Buddleia davidii), Birds of Paradise (Caesalpinea sp.), Buck Brush (Ceanothus sp.), Rabbitbrush (Chrysothamnus nauseous), Fleabane Daisy (Erigeron sp.), Blanket flower (Gaillardia sp.), Sunflower (Helianthus annuus), Gayfeather (Liatrus punctata), Honeysuckle (Lonicera sp.) Alfalfa (Meticago sativa), Mint (Mentha sp.), Bee-balm (Monarda sp.), Catnip (Nepeta

cataria), Phlox (Phlox sp.), Russian Sage (Perouskia atripilicifolia), Rosemary (rosemarinus officinalis), Prairie Cone Flower (Ratibidia columnaris), Coneflower (Rudbeckia sp.), Sage (Salvia sp.), Groundsel (Senecio sp.), Goldenrod (Solidago sp.), Marigold (Tagetes sp.), Zinnia (Zinnia sp.).

HEAR Treasurers' Report Summary

Dear HEAR residents:

The July Membership drive resulted in over 100 new members. The total memberships for 2015 to date are 438, which represents approximately 35% of the homes in the Heritage East neighborhood. Please keep encouraging your neighbors to join, it helps all of us. The income for the year has been \$12,615, and the expenses were \$11,066. The majority of the income has come from membership dues (\$11,900), but newsletter advertising and recycling have contributed \$262 and \$441 respectively. The neighborhood security patrol continues to be the largest expense (\$8562), but expenses such as the newsletter and membership drive flyer printing and mailing (\$1,376), and beautification (\$1,000) are significant, required, and important.

Council se

Tuesday October 6, 2015. Four of the 8 City Council seats will be up for election, including District 4 (where Heritage East is located). In addition, there will be a vote on eleven bond questions, three amendments to the City Charter, a question on raising the gross receipts tax, and a vote whether to allow the City Council to reallocate bond monies on the ballot.

Early voting runs from September 16th-October 2nd, from 9:00 am to 6:00pm weekdays, at any polling location. The closest polling location to Heritage East is the North Domingo Baca Multigenerational Center. A photo ID is required to vote in City of Albuquerque elections.
