### For The Birds

Welcome to Spring! Great Horned Owls are nesting in abandoned or commandeered hawks nests high in the cottonwoods in the bosque and can be located by the clamor of crows mobbing the stoic owl on the nest. Sandhill Cranes and Snow Geese have all left for the North, and Cedar Waxwings and Robins are cleaning up leftover pyracantha and juniper berries. The Dark-eyed Juncos you have been seeing on the ground all winter under your feeders will be leaving soon to spend the Summer in the mountains. The flocks of tiny, chattering Bushtits will soon be pairing off to build their pendulous nests, mostly in evergreen trees. Last year, a pair nested in a pine tree right over our driveway.

You can make nests more comfortable for all nestlings by putting out clothes dryer lint in the shrubbery. The birds will use it for nest lining. Some people say that it is not good for the nestlings, but I disagree, have done it for years, and will continue to do it. A soft bed beats a sharp stick in the bottom! Be your own judge.

According to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, the average American yard is about 60% lawn and 20% house and driveway, with just 20% left for bird habitat. Your yard has a role to play in helping to establish safe bird habitat, and they have a program called YardMap which focuses on the most familiar and extensive habitats on the continent - the yard. By comparing habitat information with bird sightings, you can learn about the effects of different gardening practices on birds. YardMap gives you the tools you need to plan your yard and share your successes with scientists, neighbors, and anyone interested in bird-friendly gardening.

If you want to get involved, you will create a digital map of your landscape using their simple pointand-click tools. You don't need to know a lot about birds or plants; just log in a couple of times a year to update your map You can use YardMap to plan bird-friendly upgrades to your property, gain recognition for your efforts, and connect with others. Citizen science is a way for you to learn about birds, habitat, science, and conservation while contributing to real scientific studies. As a partnership between the public and professional scientists, YardMap makes up one of the world's largest research teams.

Make your yard more friendly by: decreasing the size of your lawn, using fewer chemicals (fertilizers, pesticides, etc.), planting native trees, shrubs, and flowers, building a brush pile, leaving seed heads on flowers throughout winter, creating more plant structure (high, mid, and low-level), becoming an indoor cat household, and leaving your standing dead trees in place.

All for now. Here's wishing you and your yard birds a safe and happy summer.

### **Comprehensive Plan Update and Unified Development Ordinance**

In early February, the City of Albuquerque kicked off a major public process to update the Comprehensive Plan (also known as the Comp Plan) and create a Unified Development Ordinance (UDO). Collaboration with the public plays a big role in this process, and over the course of 3 days, from February 4-6, 2015 approximately 350 people participated in focus groups, public meetings and open houses. A public meeting held on the evening of February 4th began with a special session for neighborhood associations and the City's lands use and transportation experts. Karl and Cynthia Benedict attended on behalf of HEAR.

The project now known as ABC to Z, is a collaborative effort between the City of Albuquerque and Bernalillo County, whose legislative bodies jointly adopt the Albuquerque-Bernalillo County Comprehensive Plan. There are two components to this effort. The first deals with zoning. Consultants from Clarion Associates, a Denver-based firm specializing in writing zoning codes for local municipalities has been hired to improve the regulatory system that guides land use development and transportation planning citywide, including major updates to the Zoning Code and Development Process Manual. Their objective is to develop a Unified Development Ordinance (UDO). Clarion Associates will be conducting public meetings to generate and propose draft revisions to the Zoning Code, Development Process Manual, and other land use regulations. The UDO portion of this planning effort will proceed in several steps, gathering comments at each stage as stakeholders review the proposals: 1) new zoning districts and uses allowed in each; 2) design standards that determine the required quality of development; 3) the processes and criteria for review and approval of development projects and 4) mapping of new zone districts. .

In the second part of the effort, the City will be embarking on a major overhaul of its framework for land use regulations to implement an updated Comp Plan. A consultant team, Fregonese and Associates, will be the leading the Comp Plan portion of the project. They will be returning to Albuquerque in early spring to conduct a series of workshops with neighborhoods and other stakeholders. Afterward, updated language will be drafted for public and agency review and an updated Comp Plan will be submitted for the review and approval process by late Fall. This effort will



focus in part on better coordination of land use and transportation to improve walkable districts, support transit friendly development and enhance cycling options.

### Driveway and Vehicle Safety

Kids are going to fall, crash, slip and tumble. It's all a part of being a kid. But there are little things we can all do to ensure the kids avoid the more serious injuries that can lead to disabilities and even death. Here are a few tips to keep your kids safe in and around cars.

- We know you're often in a hurry, but before you drive away, take a few seconds to walk all the way around your parked car to check for children.
- When checking for kids around your vehicle, see if anything that could attract a child, such as a pet, bike or toy, is under or behind your vehicle before getting in and starting the engine.
- Identify and use safe play areas for children, away from parked or moving vehicles. Teach kids to play in these areas instead of in, around or behind a car.
- Accompany little kids when they get in and out of a vehicle. Hold their hands while walking near moving vehicles or in driveways and parking lots or on sidewalks.
- Don't allow children to play unattended in parking lots when cars are present.
- Designate a safe spot for children to wait nearby when vehicles are about to move, and make sure the drivers can see them.
- Teach kids that trunks are for transporting cargo and are not safe places to play or hide.
- Make sure you lock your vehicle, including doors and trunks when you're not using it. Keep keys and remote entry fobs out of children's sight and reach.

The calendar year 2014 closed with a balance of \$11,747.15 in the bank. Expenses were primarily for Security. Newsletter printing and mailing, neighborhood beautification and volunteer appreciation. In 2014 we had 493 dues paying members. Compared to 526 in 2013, a decrease of 33 members.
